HI Nichola,

I am please to attach the figures for the Paddock Wood Toad Patrols in 2023.

In summary:

- Patrols started on 18th February and ran for a month, although there was a break of just over a
 week in early March, due to intense cold weather, when the animals stopped moving. The main
 toad spawning didn't occur in the pond until 15 March, about a week later than normal.
- 627 toads were rescued from the surrounding roads and taken to the main Putland pond.
- The main roads patrolled were Ashcroft Road / Kiln Way / The Bines / Chaffinch Way, with Ashcroft Road and Kiln Way proving to be the most active toad highways.
- Toads are mainly rescued from either the roadside gully pots or alongside the kerbs.
- Due to the patrol teams efforts, toad deaths were fairly low in 2023.
- Counting breeding toads in the pond was difficult in 2023, due to extensive vegetation growth around the pond. Recent clearance should make this easier in 2024.
- The smaller drainage pond at Putlands is hardly used at all now, although ten years ago is was extensively used by frogs. It may well be that there has been a chemical change to the water / silt, making it unsuitable. Amphibians are highly susceptible to chemical pollution, and I suspect that the smaller pond is the main drainage pond for the Putland Sports centre car park, so there may well have been a build up of chemicals in the silt in this pond.

Happy to answer any questions councillors may have about toad usage of the ponds at Putlands.

Dogs in Paddock Wood Cemetery

Councillors and personnel have noticed some concerns with dogs in the cemetery. Most dogs seem to be off lead, even though there are signs stating that dogs must be on a lead, past certain areas of the cemetery. There have also been ongoing issues with dog fowling, especially on the pathways and near burials.

To tackle this an option would be to install new, larger, signage with more specific wording and rules, making it clearer for residents.

Residents have been able to use the unused section of the cemetery as public open space for decades. Applications can be found on TWBC showing this from 1979 – 2005: https://twbcpa.midkent.gov.uk/online-applications/searchResultsBack.do?action=back

Researching other Council's rules and regulations on dogs in cemeteries, most state no dogs allowed off leads. Some express no dogs permitted at all (with the exception of Guide/Assistance Dogs). Some larger cemeteries and Towns have gone as far as enforcing fines if dogs are found off leads or in a cemetery where dogs are not permitted. They can do this with the support of enforcement officers, under a PSPO (Public Spaces Protection Order) – Sports grounds and parks in Tunbridge Wells and surround have some of these in place. Paddock Wood Town Council do not have enforcement powers to implement something like this.

Local Council examples below;

Tonbridge Cemetery:

Dogs must be kept on leads at all times within Tonbridge Cemetery

Pembury Burial Grounds:

Dogs must be on a lead at all times and under full control.

Southborough Cemetery and St Peters Church Yard

No dogs are permitted in the cemetery with the exception of Guide Dogs, Hearing Dogs or other recognised Assistance Dogs, or with the express permission of the Town Clerk.

Hadlow Cemetery

Dogs must be kept on a short leash at all times, and a visitor in control of a dog must remove any waste from the Cemetery.

Mardens rules: 1.8 Dogs:

You may NOT bring your dog into the cemetery. However, for reasons of safety the Parish Council will permit dogs on leads using the footpath to the cemetery to pass through the cemetery in order to access public footpaths further down Maidstone Road. You must keep your dog on a lead at all times, you must stay on the paths and you must pick up your dog's faeces. Guide Dogs are allowed in any part of the cemetery.

Kent & Sussex Crematorium (Tunbridge Wells):

Dogs or Other Animals – Only when assisting their disabled owner will dogs registered for this purpose be permitted within the cemetery. All other dogs and/or other animals are not permitted within the cemetery.

Northumberland County Council

Dog Control Order

(Dogs on leads)

The Council has made a Public Spaces Protection Order (known as a Dog Control Order) to deal with various issues including a requirement to keep dogs on leads in certain designated areas.

Any dog that you have with you on any land used as a Memorial, Burial Ground, Cemetery or Garden of Rememberance, and any land classified as an 'A' or 'B' road, together with adjoining verges etc, on such roads must be kept on a lead of not more than 1.5 metres in length at all times.

Failure to comply with this requirement is an offence for which you may be prosecuted and fined up to £1000.

Cemetery Access and Opening Hours

The cemeteries are open for pedestrian access to the public from dawn until dusk all year round.

No vehicular access is permitted with the exception of official funeral vehicles, maintenance and emergency vehicles.

Entry to a cemetery outside these hours is an offence, any person entering when a cemetery is closed do so at their own risk and is liable upon conviction to a fine.

Copies of the current cemetery rules are available from Marmion House on request.



Dogs are not permitted within any of the cemeteries, with the exception that a dog belonging to a person visiting a grave will be allowed provided it is kept on a lead at all times,

. Contravention of this may result in a fine upon conviction.

Some suggestions that could be included in the new signs

Restricted area: Dogs are not



permitted in certain areas of the cemetery. Such as near gravesites, for respect purposes, burial services, or areas marked as of limits for maintenance.

Hours of access: The cemetery may have specific hours when dogs are allowed. Ensure that these hours are clearly communicated to the public.

Enforcement: Town Council members or designated personnel have the authority to enforce these rules and request non-compliant individuals to adhere to them or leave the premises.

Clean up policy: Owners are required to clean up after their dogs. They must carry suitable waste bags and dispose of any dog waste in designated bins outside the cemetery premises.

Leash requirement: All dogs brought into the cemetery must be on a leash and under the control of their owners, at all times.

Respectful Behaviour: Owners should be mindful of the atmosphere in the cemetery and ensure that their dogs do not engage in behaviour that might disrupt or disturb others paying respects.

Please can members decide on the wording of the new signs that PWTC can implement and or any other suggestions.


